General Questions to Ask

Your child's doctor wants to answer your questions first. These checkups are a good time to ask about how your child is growing, acting, and feeling.

General Questions

- Is my baby up to date on vaccines?
- Is my baby at a healthy weight? How can I make sure they are getting enough to eat?
- How can I make sure my baby is sleeping safely and getting enough sleep?
- How can I help my baby learn to talk?
- What books can I read to my baby?
- Is it okay for my baby to have screen time? How much?
- How do I clean my baby's teeth?
- What do I do if my baby gets sick?
- How can I reach a doctor or nurse when the office is closed?

This handy booklet has space for notes.
Take it with you to your doctor's visits.

Benefits of Well-Child Visits

1. **Prevention:** Vaccines help keep your child from getting sick. Ask your child's doctor about healthy eating and staying safe at home and at school.
2. **Tracking Growth and Development:** Check how much your child has grown since the last visit. Talk with your child's doctor about milestones, learning, and social skills.
3. **Raising Concerns:** Make a list of topics to talk about with your child's doctor. This can include behavior, sleep, eating, or getting along with other family members. Pick your top 3–5 questions. Share them at the start of the visit.
4. **Team Approach:** Regular visits help you, your child, and the doctor build trust and work together.

San Bernardino County and local health plans **DO NOT** share your personal information with immigration officials.

Every month, by law, the California Department of Health Care Services sends basic Medi-Cal information (like your name, address, and birthday) to the federal government. This is a normal part of how Medi-Cal works.

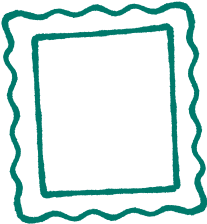

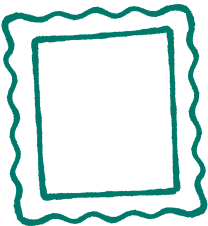

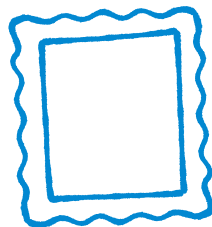

What to Expect at Your Child’s Doctor Visit	- Physical exam - Check weight, height, and head size - Check muscle strength - Check hips Screenings - Hearing Immunizations - HepB: second dose, if not given in the first month - Rotavirus: first dose - Diphtheria, tetanus, acellular pertussis (DTaP): first dose - Haemophilus influenzae type B (Hib): first dose - Pneumococcal conjugate f (PCV): first dose - Inactivated polio (IPV): first dose
Your Doctor May Ask	- If your baby drinks anything other than breast milk or iron-fortified formula, they could get anemia. - About safe sleep practices. - About other safety issues, like over-bundling or car seat use.

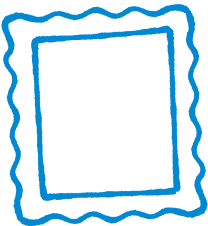

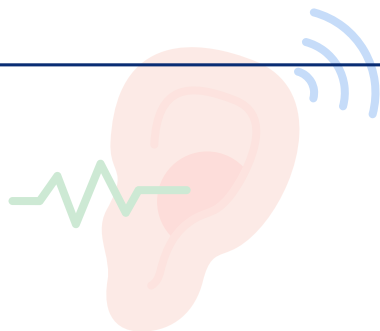
Hearing Screenings

Your baby has hearing tests at two months and 15 months old. During this time, a baby's hearing can get worse slowly or all at once.

Use this checklist to see how your baby is hearing.

If your baby misses any two items for their age, call your doctor.

Age	Hearing and Understanding
Birth to three months	☐ Startles at loud, sudden noises within 3 feet. ☐ Becomes calm to a familiar, friendly voice. ☐ Wakes up when you speak or make noise nearby.
Three to six months	☐ Looks to see where sounds come from. ☐ Becomes scared by an angry voice. ☐ Smiles when someone talks to them. ☐ Likes to play with toys or objects that make noise.



Hearing Screenings

Age Level	Hearing and Understanding
Six to nine months	☐ Turns and looks at you when you are speaking in a quiet voice. ☐ Waves when you say “bye-bye.” ☐ Stops for a moment when you say “no-no.” ☐ Looks at objects or pictures when someone talks about them
Nine to 12 months	☐ Points to or looks at familiar objects or people when asked to. ☐ Looks sad when scolded. ☐ Follows directions (“Open your mouth,” “Give me the ball”). ☐ Dances and makes sounds to music
12 to 18 months	☐ Points to body parts (hair, eyes, nose, mouth) when asked to. ☐ Brings objects to you when asked. ☐ Hears and knows sounds from another room or from outside.

Hearing Screenings

Age Level	Hearing and Understanding
18 to 24 months	☐ Understands simple yes or no questions. ☐ Understands simple phrases with words like “in” (for example, “in the cup”). ☐ Likes being read to and points to pictures when asked.
24 to 30 months	☐ Understands words like “no more” or “not now.” ☐ Can pick objects by size (big or little). ☐ Follows simple directions, like “Get your shoes and socks.”

You know your child better than anyone. If you think your child might not be hearing well, ask your doctor for a hearing test.

- Smiles to get your attention

- Makes “oooo” or “aahhh” sounds
- Turns their head towards the sound of parents’ voice

- Looks at hands with interest
- Holds head steady without support
- Holds toy when placed in hand
- Uses arm to swing toys
- Brings hand to mouth
- Pushes up onto elbows or forearms when on tummy
- Makes bubble-making sounds with their mouth

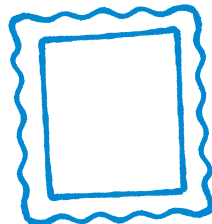

What to Expect at Your Child’s Doctor Visit	- Physical exam - Check weight, height, and head size - Oral assessment Screenings - Lead: can start as early as six months of age - Tuberculosis Immunizations - Rotavirus: third dose as needed - DTaP: third dose - Hib: third dose as needed - PCV: third dose - IPV (Polio): third dose - HepB: third dose - Influenza (flu): six-month-old children should receive the seasonal flu vaccine as it becomes available - COVID-19: speak with your doctor about dosage
Your Doctor May	- Apply fluoride varnish after your baby’s first tooth appears. Most babies’ teeth may begin to emerge around six months of age. - Ask how your child is growing and meeting milestones.

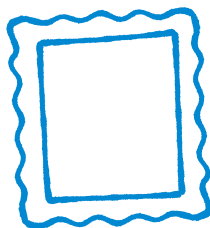

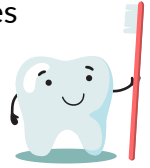

What to Expect at Your Child's Doctor Visit	- Physical exam - Check weight, height, and head size - Oral assessment Screenings - Lead, if not already completed. - Developmental: Your doctor will ask questions about how your baby is growing and acting. They might watch you play with your baby to see how your baby is doing. The results will show if your baby is growing at a normal pace. Immunizations - Any vaccines that were missed or delayed at previous appointments - Flu: one or two doses in flu season - COVID-19: speak with your doctor about dosage
Your Doctor May	- Apply fluoride varnish after your baby's first tooth appears. Most babies' teeth may begin to emerge around six months of age. - Ask how your child is growing and meeting milestones.

9-Month Visit

- Is shy, clingy, or fearful around strangers
- Shows looks on face (happy, sad, angry, and surprised)
- Looks when you call their name
- Reacts when you leave
- Smiles or laughs when playing peek-a-boo

- Lifts arms to be picked up
- Gets to a sitting position
- Moves things from one hand to another
- Uses fingers to rake food toward their body
- Sits without support

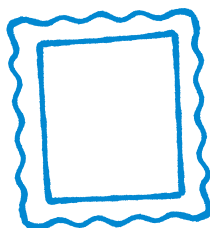

What to Expect at Your Child's Doctor Visit	- Physical exam - Oral assessment Screenings - Lead, if not already completed - Tuberculosis - Anemia Immunizations - Any vaccines that were missed or delayed at previous appointments - Hib: third or fourth dose - PCV: fourth dose - Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR): first dose - Chicken Pox - Varicella: first dose - Hepatitis A (HepA): two-dose series - Flu: one or two doses in flu season - COVID-19: speak with your doctor about dosage
Your Doctor May	- See if your baby follows simple instructions. - Check if your baby can pick up small objects or stand alone. - Talk about dental health and checkups.

Milestones (at 12 months)

- Waves “bye-bye”
- Plays games with you, like pat-a-cake
- Calls a parent “mama” or “dada” or another special name
- Understands “no” (pauses briefly or stops when you say it)
- Puts something in a container, like a block in a cup
- Looks for things that you hide, like a toy under a blanket
- Pulls up to stand
- Walks, holding on to furniture
- Drinks from a cup without a lid, as you hold it
- Picks things up between thumb and pointer finger, like small bits of food

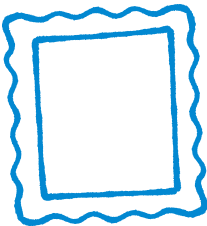
Did You Know...

Did You Know...

Letting your toddler make choices for some things can help prevent fights about other things. When you can, let your child pick between two options that are okay with you.

For example, let them choose between two of their favorite books to read at bedtime.

- How should I handle naps, bedtime, or helping my child soothe themselves at night?

Appendix

Vaccine Name	Recommended Dosage	Why It's Important
Hepatitis B (HepB)	Three doses	Helps protect your child from a virus that attacks the liver
Rotavirus	Two doses*	Keeps your baby from getting sick with a virus that causes vomiting and diarrhea
Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)	One dose recommended if not given to mother during pregnancy*	Helps protect babies from a virus that causes lung and breathing infections that can lead to hospital stays
Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis (DTaP)	Four doses in baby's first year	Protects your child from three dangerous diseases that cause choking coughs (whooping cough), breathing problems, and painful muscle spasms

*Dosage may vary depending on series and your doctor's recommendations.

Vaccine Name	Protects Against	Why It's Important
Haemophilus influenzae type b (HIB)	Three to four doses*	Protects your child from a germ that can cause meningitis and other serious infections
Pneumococcal Vaccine (PCV)	Four doses	Helps prevent ear infections, pneumonia, and infections of the blood or brain caused by the Pneumococcal bacteria
Inactivated Polio (IPV)	Three doses in baby's first year	Protects your child from a virus that can cause paralysis or trouble moving muscles
Influenza (Flu) Vaccine	One to two doses during flu season* (October to February)	Helps keep your child from getting sick with the flu virus

*Dosage may vary depending on series and your doctor's recommendations.

Vaccine Name	Protects Against	Why It's Important
Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR)	One dose by baby's first year	Keeps your child safe from three serious diseases that can cause rashes, fevers, swelling, or serious problems later in life
Chickenpox - Varicella (VAR)	One dose by baby's first year	Prevents itchy rashes and fevers, and protects from serious skin infections or pneumonia
